Sheet With a Wincester.

On Monday last news was received here that a man named James Priddy had been accidentally shot through the stomach while out on a shooting party. The ball, about a mile north of Brainerd, on the Loock Lake road. On Saturday evening, in company with five men the body arrived in the city and was taken to Loscy & Dean's where the coroner viewed the remains and after hearing the details developed that an inquest was not necessary. From Michael Owens, a cousin of the unfortunate man, we learn the following facts in regard to the fatal accident.

Mr. Owens, who was holding a claim in the indemnity belt, on this day six gentlemen who were holding claims near by had assembled at J. P. Dewey's cabin where they were to get their mail, it being mail day. In the afternoon, immediately after dinner, Mr. Doherty and Mr. Priddy were to go out to a place where a couple of sheep had been and see if there were any goats. Before they started another of the settlers asked Mr. Priddy to show him some of the things he had done so when he was accidentally shot by J. P. Doherty, who was standing in the fire line, and proceeded to the trip. Mr. Priddy was sitting in the doorway with his gun across his lap, and had the hammer raised but he did not know it when a lady who was staying at the camp came along and he got up to allow her to pass. He then went to the gun and he had been fired. He has been lamed by the trigger. The wounded man fell to the floor but managed to get up on his feet and got into a chair. A messenger was dispatched to Crow's ranch for a doctor and he arrived in Brainerd, but after coming ten miles with him the doctor found the man dead.

The young man who held the gun when it was discharged was named James Priddy, and was the brother of the man who was killed. The remains were taken to Durwin Saturday evening for interment.
