ROBBED THE EXPRESS.
\$15,000 Stolen From the N. P. Express Office in This City.

A most mysterious affair—No clue to the perpetrators of the robbery of the express office in this city. This city yesterday morning was thrown into a state of intense excitement by the news that a large amount of the N. P. express office had been robbed of \$15,000 in cash. The express office is situated at the corner of the city.

Rosenbush and other Brainerd merchants, made an attempt to break jail yesterday and would have succeeded if a fellow prisoner had not given Sheriff Spaulding the tip. They had dug the brick wall behind the cell and were only waiting for a good chance to drop out. Their diet was a little thin for the next few days.
