## Artificial Rain Storms.

"We can flood this country at will," is what the United States government rain-makers claim. They claim it actually, if they can, they need neither any more drought or failure of crops anywhere. Well, it is no longer easy to say that anything is impossible. It was not so long ago that the rain-makers were regarded as the makers of the rain. It was not so long ago that the experimenters got in their work. It was accomplished by a large balloon filled with explosives, a large number of kites having their tails loaded with dynamite and many charges of powder were scattered in various directions over the ground upon an area of two miles. First the huge balloons were set off by electricity. Ten minutes later the dynamite tails of the kite were set off by the same means. Last of all the powder was touched off. In ten minutes the barometer fell rapidly and a rainstorm was born. In thirty minutes the rain was heard forty miles away and made a noise like artillery. The rain covered an estimated area of 1,000 square miles and the cost of this put at one and one-half cents per acre-inch. Still further experiments were made and a doubt that the experimenters brought the rain, there will be in your mind the question, "Would it have rained anyway?" If the explosion did really create the refreshing showers, however, then they mark the beginning of an era, in civilization, and come an era which will not be less than the invention of the steam engine.—Buffalo Journal.
