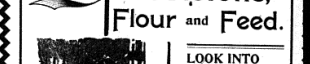

A PLACE OF CONFINEMENT CAPTIVITY RECALLED.

Thousands of Rebel Officers Confined in this State During the War—Johnston's Island, Lake Erie, and to Cemetery of Confederate Dead.

Sandusky, O., Correspondence.—With the death in this city of the venerable Leonard B. Johnson, a man passed away whose name is, by the circumstances of his life, inseparably linked with the history of his country. Mr. Johnson was the owner of the famous island of Lake Erie, known as Camp Douglas, near Chicago, 9,000 at Camp Chase, near Columbus, and 4,000 at Camp Morton, near Indianapolis. Then with the aid of over 10,000 other confederates and northern sympathizers who had congregated at various points to aid in the consummation of the plot, they hoped to strike a fatal blow at the Union at a time when, according to the calculations of the conspirators, General Early was to lay siege to Washington and thus make it impossible for the federal government to send troops to the points to be attacked.

As a part of the program was carried out, Colonel Cook, who had been deposed, was ordered to obtain possession of the island at the close of the war for the purpose of establishing a permanent training ground. Provisions are made for an investigation to show the cause and means of preventing excessive floods on the river between the government dam at Sandy Lake and Brainerd, Minn., and the effect of these overflows on navigation. It is further provided that those funds \$2500 may be used in the payment of damages to lands caused by the failure of the natural outbankment at the Pine River reservoir in June, 1906.
