**THE CITY OF PONCE.**

SECOND IN COMMERCIAL IMPORTANCE IN PORTO RICO.

General Miller's Troops Landed Near the City on the South Coast—Ponce is said to be the Island's Most Thriving City—Military Defenses Are Weak.

Ponce, where 400 troops landed recently, is the second city in commercial importance in Porto Rico. It is believed to have been founded in 1650, but its development was slow, and it was not until 1848 that it received the title of villa. From that time on its growth was rapid, and in 1877 it became a city. At present it has a population of 22,000, and being the chief town of the official district of the same name, its jurisdiction extends over 25,000 people who live outside the city.

Ponce is situated on a plain about two miles from its port, Parga, where all the import and export trade is transacted. The port has about 5,000 inhabitants, and here are the custom house, the office of the captain of the port and the offices of the various consulates. The bay is large and will admit vessels of 25 feet draft. A fine road leads to the city.

Ponce is regularly built, the buildings in the central part being of brick, while the material chiefly used for suburban construction is wood. It is the home of the military commander of the district and the seat of an efficient chamber of commerce. The city contains two churches, one of them Protestant, said to be the only one in the Spanish Antilles, a military hospital, a public library, a municipal public library, three good hotels, a fire department, perfectly equipped with American apparatus, a theater and a bank. The Catholic church, which dates from the foundation of the town, was reconstructed in 1828 and finished in 1847. Its structure is 235 feet long and 120 feet broad, with two steeples, and contains richly decorated altars.

The theater is the finest on the island. It is built mostly of iron and marble and cost over 70,000 pesos. The interior is handsomely decorated, and by a mechanical contrivance may be turned into a dancing hall.

Ponce is said to be the most beautiful city on the island, and yellow fever is never known there. The climate is hot and dry, but sea breezes by day and land breezes by night keep it from becoming oppressive. An ample water supply also adds greatly to the comfort of the city's inhabitants.

The only line of railroad which connects Ponce with other towns is that running westward to Yauco, a distance of about 22 miles. The road from San Juan across the island, 70 miles in length, ends at Ponce and is in good condition for travel throughout the year. The military defenses around the city are weak, but a series of earthworks have recently been thrown up along the hills to the north. West of the city which contract the channel at the entrance to the width of about a quarter of a mile. A low, sharp point marks the end of the bay's eastern side, while on the west rises a bold headland, crowned by a hill. Two small islands, the Cabras, covered with brushwood, lie off the eastern point. The reef which bars the entrance also strikes the interior

Hardwood Floors.  
An authority on the care of hard-  
wood floors says that water is the worst  
possible thing to use upon them. Any  
liquid spilled on a polished floor, unless  
it is promptly removed, will leave a  
spot, and, if there is a scratch, discolor-  
ing is permanently. Sweep a daily, and  
dust with a piece of grain carpet  
mat, or wrapped about a broom.  
If there are solid spots wipe up with  
turpentine. Remember, however, if  
the floor is waxed, this will remove the  
wax, which must be applied again,  
being careful not to extend the waxing  
beyond the original spot. Melt a little  
beeswax in a cup over the register, or  
hot lamp, and on the back of the rug  
Apply with a soft cloth, and rub hard.  
This will remove much staining from  
carpet or woodwork with pumice stone  
and water, rub evenly until all stains  
are removed, but do not be on with  
many strokes, but do not be on with  
much water. If you have a stain that  
should be gone over with a weighted  
brush. These brushes are a great ex-  
cess to have with, but pay for their  
service in the end. They should always  
be covered with a soft cloth and kept  
in the end. An admirable substitute for  
French for polishing floors, furniture  
and marble, is composed of one pound  
of wax and one pint turpentine. Melt the  
wax in a water bath of granite heat.  
When the wax is removed from the oil,  
and beat in the turpentine.

Use a quart can kept for the purpose,  
pour in the oil and the soap, and let  
stirring it. Put in quarter of a tea-  
spoonful each of salt, sugar, soda and  
ginger. This is the best recipe for  
milk; add nearly a pint of boiling wa-  
ter, stir well, and let stand in a  
four to make a not very thick batter;  
set in a kettle of warm water, but  
be careful not to boil, set early in morn-  
ing; it will be light by noon, or soon  
after. To make the bread use equal  
parts of sweet milk and warm water,  
mix with one-half cup of yeast, stir  
enough to knead well, put in pan, set  
over warm water, cover close, and  
when light bake. Deep cases are best  
for this bread, as it runs more easily  
than bread of yeast, and will bake  
through in less time.

Hot Yeast.  
Put six common-sized potatoes and  
boil in five quarts of water. Tie a good  
handful of hops in cheesecloth and boil  
with them. When the potatoes are  
done take out the hops, drain the wa-  
ter into a clean dish, mash the potato-  
es, and the potato water with one cupful  
each of salt and sugar and two table-  
spoonfuls of ginger. Let it come to a  
boil and pour into a clean jar, when  
cool enough to handle, stir in a pint  
of good lively yeast. Keep in a warm  
place for very light, take out what is  
wanted for yeast cakes, and tie up the  
remainder closely in the jar and set  
in a cool place. Thicken the yeast with  
boiled corn meal for yeast cakes, make  
into small shapes and dry in the shade.  
Two cups or a cupful of the liquid  
yeast will make five medium-sized loaves.

Favorite Bread Recipes—Corn Yeast.  
Shell and brown in oven. Use coffee,  
one teaspoonful of good yeast. When  
done put into a small bag with open  
half cupful of hops, tie up and boil in  
one quart of water for four or five  
large parrot potatoes for twenty-four  
minutes. Remove from the fire, drain  
out the sack and put potatoes through  
a sieve; add three quarts of hot water,  
and when lukewarm put in one tea-  
spoonful of salt, one of sugar and half a  
cupful of old yeast. Stir well and set  
in a warm place to rise. In a cool  
place this yeast will keep good for  
three months.

French Biscuits.  
Six pounds of flour, one and a half  
pounds of sugar, six ounces of butter,  
one and one-half cupfuls of eggs, six  
tablespoonfuls of cream, and one teaspoonful  
together, add one cupful of good  
yeast, set in a warm place for very light,  
make into small biscuits, and bake in a  
quick oven.
