LITTLE FALLS is threatened with a diphtheria epidemic and the public schools have been closed.
The government engineers say there will be no floods on the upper Mississippi this spring unless unusually heavy rains fall. The snow in the river basin is not heavy.

UNLESS Gov. Lind thinks it necessary and gives his consent the bill has been introduced in the legislature for this session. The limitation expired on Saturday.

The **San Cevro Herald** is of the opinion that either Judge Collins or Capt. S. R. Van Sant will be the next republican candidate for governor and either of them can be elected.

The **Great Northern** fire struck a slight load of people at South Center on Monday afternoon, killing one lady outright, and seriously injuring two other people who will probably die.

The legislature has provided for two additional insane asylums, one to be built at once at Anoka and the other at Hastings when needed, the site having been decided on. The Anoka asylum will be the fourth in the state.

In speaking of members with influence in the house of representatives in his **Elk River Blue-Knave, Speaker Darr** says:
"Another gentleman who did good work for the Anoka people is Representative Ferris of Brainerd. Ferris is no talker, but it is undoubtedly the best man to be elected to a proposition there in the house I would rather have Ferris active in support of a measure than that of a dozen orators."

EMPLOYEES of the Twin City Rapid Transit Co. have had their wages increased 10 per cent by Thomas Lewer, which means an additional expense of 800,000 a year to the company. This is but an instance of the return of good Brainerd times as the wages of between 300,000 and 400,000 workmen have been increased during the past six months, and as the St. Cloud Journal-Press remarks, "they are paid in dollars worth 100 cents, too."

The county attorney at Bemidji has succeeded in carrying his point and the saloons there are closed. An exchange says:
"The night after the recent election in which the saloon element was defeated County Attorney Street caused several arrests and confiscation of some of the gambling apparatus. Win Maguire in the village marshall and was opposed to County Attorney Street, being under the orders of the village president. Grand Rapids is having about the same experience as Bemidji, but there most of the attack is against gamblers and disorderly houses. In both villages it was claimed that men from the woods are being cheated out of their wages."

A conflict of the various tribes of the **Chippewa Indians** was held at Leech Lake Tuesday. Chief Merve is the new agent, being present. The council was presided over by Chief Flatmouth, with William Songa as official interpreter. The council set forth the Indians' many causes for complaint. They were in the first place, totally opposed to the sale of the pine lands of the reservation, and wanted the timber cut under the Menominee plan, and telegraphed the secretary of the interior to that effect. They stated that they wanted five line in game and good will with the whites, and deeply deplored the uprising of last October. May-day, however, a Bear Island chief gave the most positive assurances to Capt. Merve that the Indians would not resist the foolishness of last year.

His Death a Sad Blow.
In an account of the death of Timothy Enright at Manila, a Todd County Argus correspondent from Grey Eagle, at which place the parents of the deceased lived, says:
"Full particulars cannot be obtained at this writing, but it is supposed he was detailed to do some repair work on some of the city wires and in some way came in contact with a live wire. It is a sad blow to the aged parents who are nearly over-taken this spring and were looking forward to the time when the 18th would be mustered out of service and Tim would come home and help them carry on the farm. We understand Mr. Enright will have his son's body sent here for burial."

W. G. PERCY WRITES OF HIS TRIP.
An Interesting Letter From a Former Brainerdite Now in Arizona.
(Continued from last week.)

Alfalfa is the greatest producer in the valley. It resembles hay, particularly clover, but grows much higher and from three to five crops a year are cut from it and cattle and horses get nothing else to eat and get fat on it. I was surprised when I learned that cattle being fattened for market were not fed grain; they are turned into growing alfalfa and there get fatted heavy. Horses, when they are doing heavy work, are never fed grain. Alfalfa contains an abundance of nutrition and grows fast with plenty of water. The Salt River is adequate enough usually in this section till August, when the river gets low and the canals do not fill as during the early season, but by August they use a less quantity of water than during the previous months for irrigating purposes, so that a farmer who is at home attending to his farm when the water is there can usually get enough to supply his place. The water is turned on in one or three days and then shut off and turned in another three days and back again in the manner, so that a man gets three days to make his place in the water to open and close the gates, bank the ditches, and otherwise attend to the care of his land. I have been out to several of the large ranches, and many say this is a fine country for farming; of course there are some things in the vegetable line they don't do well under the irrigating plan, for instance, we can't raise "Irish potatoes" here, there are all shipped in from California, they will grow but cannot be kept and are not of good taste and are watery; the same is true of sweet potatoes, radishes and onions. Lettuce, beets, cabbage, lettuce and small onions do well, and are raised in large quantities for market by Chinese gardeners.

All the fruits are raised here, including oranges, lemons, figs, dates, peaches, apricots, plums, apples and the large grades of grapes, also English walnuts, almonds and pecan nuts. Many points of interest are offered the visitor and tourist near Phoenix. A large ostrich farm is operated three miles north of the city, and one mile east of this farm is government Indian school and farm; here hundreds of the Pima and Maricopa tribes of children are housed and educated, they have several large brick buildings, including schools, class rooms, ladies' dormitories and boys' boarding house; they have among their many novelties a good horse band, all Indian boys, and they play nicely. Three miles east of the city is the hospital for insane and feeble minded, and at Tempe, ten miles east of the city, is located the territorial normal school. The city of Tucson has the territorial university, and I am told it occupies a high rank among the educational institutions of the country. The city of Phoenix occupies a level spot of ground and is nicely laid out, its principal street east and west is called Washington, and all other running parallel to it. It is also called after the president, the principal street north and south and crossing Washington, is styled Center street, and all streets parallel to it on the east are called streets commencing to count at First street and running in numerical order, and those parallel to Center on the west if it are called avenues and count the same as the streets. The streets are all level and hard, and the principal ones kept sprinkled, they allow driving and bicycling; the country roads are also good whirling ones. Some very fine buildings adorn the city, among which is the city hall and county court house, on Washington, both of which occupy a square and have fine parks surrounding them. The Adams and Ford Hotels are the two largest and finest hotels, they are patronized principally by the tourists from the east who represent the rich people of the states and who come here to spend the winter months which are more or less disagreeable at their homes; people in this class are represented from nearly every state from Minnesota to New York. It is stated here that these people spend \$1,500,000 each winter here and it is visibly seen by people who reside here the depression it makes when they come home by April 1st to go back to their homes. There are also other smaller hotels and many restaurants and cafes and a large number of rooming or lodging houses where rooms are to be had from \$10 to \$15 a month. Board at the restaurants on the American plan is \$5 a week, others are run on the European plan. There is a fine system of city schools, the Central school occupies a square, has four "ten rooms and over 600 pupils. The mountains in this vicinity and throughout Arizona are laden with rich ore, the largest mine in the world is at Jerome, 150 miles north of here, they employ over 2,000 people, and mine copper, gold and silver, the mine is owned by Senator W. C. Clark, Montana, and pays a net profit of \$7,000,000 a year. There are other large mines all over the territory and mining is a leading branch of industry. There are valuable building and ornamental stones to be had in nearly any of the mountain regions. There are large quantities of quartz, of which I send you by mail under separate cover and

sample. I smoothed one side so that by dipping the sample in water you will see clearly the grain as they are polished. The Salt River Valley is only one of the numerous fertile valleys of this great Arizona, for each day I am glad to like the more. We have the largest number of clear sky days of any state in the union. Arizona has a phenomenal climate, the winters are very pleasant to those who are well, but to one suffering with a pulmonary trouble or rheumatism it is not so much so, yet the days are perfect and enjoyable, but during the winter and spring months, as soon as the sun sets, one who is not well is not comfortable out doors as the drop of temperature is rather sudden, and one takes cold very easily. On the other hand during the summer months from June till October it gets very warm, and if one can't stand to perform laborious work in the sun, it is not so uncomfortable. But this is the season that does the most people good, especially one with a trouble like mine, that of a bronchitis or lung affection, he gets pines freely, yet can find lots of shade from the sun till he gets used to it, and the heat is not so bad as it is with those who have come here from the east very low, has been that the summers were to them the most beneficial—so here goes for an Arizona summer, it feels like a starter today, 86 in the shade, but it is not so hot as it is in the shade, 120 here any more than 90 in Minnesota, and I believe it is, for I don't feel uncomfortable today at 86 with woolen clothes on, the same kind I had on when I was in the north, there at 86. The resident people here are made up of principally Americans from eastern states, there are a few German and French, but I notice a scarcity of stoutest and long tongues. There are also a large percent of Mexicans and some Indians. The Mexicans are a shrewd people, not very fond of labor, but they are very honest, and some of Spanish, Mexican and Pima Indian. The capital of the territory has been at Tucson, Prescott and Phoenix during the past 10 years, but it is now permanently located at Phoenix, and Phoenix is now in full progress upon the new capital building which is to cost \$250,000 and completed.

When I came to Phoenix I hardly expected to find anyone I knew, but the first day I was here upon getting into the street I saw a good see the Phoenix Park, I met D. C. Blandy on the car going to look at the park with a view of giving an exhibition with his dogs there. He, and I met a man coming towards me who looked like Dr. J. H. Howes to me. The next day while I was seated in the Watkins Pharmacy the same man came in to buy a cigar. I was reassured as to who it was and stepped up and asked him if he was not the man I look him for, and when I told him who I was he was pleased to meet me. We have had some pleasant times together in the two weeks Doo has been here. He came from Las Cruces, N. M., to look into some mining near here. He thinks New Mexico and Arizona are the only countries on earth. He is contemplating the erection of a hospital or sanitarium at Las Cruces for treatment of tubercular troubles, and expects to build a two-story building \$10,000 and have it ready by next October. Doo and I would sit on the veranda of the Commercial where he was stopping, and he would say "Just look at this, Percy, for an ideal day and for February. Why would you think of living in Minnesota after seeing this? Just think of our folks if that frozen country."

There is one thing that every man should notice here, and that is the action of the rooster, he crows any time of the day or night here, and particularly between 8 and 10 p. m. in his voice heard throughout the city. The seasons here pay only \$200 a year house and they run up over \$1000 included, and each have more or less of gamey joint in connection. The lodges here represent the Masons, Knights Pythians, Woodmen, Odd Fellows, A. O. U. W., and a few others. I visited the local A. O. U. lodge, and they have a good one.

Nearly all the churches have a place here, and appear to be in a flourishing condition. Well, it is nearly dinner hour or supper as we call it at home, so will close by saying I am feeling lots better than when I left home six weeks ago and am gaining in the three weeks that I have been here, getting so I can hardly wait till meal hours. Oh, I have lots of falls in Arizona. With regards to all my Brainerd friends, I remain, Yours truly, W. G. PERCY.

FARM AND GARDEN.

MATTERS OF INTEREST TO AGRICULTURISTS.

Beauty-in-Data Shows About Cultivation of the Soil and Tools Thereof—Mechanics, Viticulture and Poultry.

The weather is a mystery. In making out a list of implements to be purchased this spring put the weather down near the head of the list. If you have not one already in use on the farm, write C. G. Williams in National Bookman and Farmer. The farms are few that do not have a need for this implement. I should hate to undertake to care for a crop of corn or potatoes without one, and of course it is useful for many other operations upon the farm. It must be remembered, however, that the weeder is not intended for deep cultivation; it simply scratches the surface. It consists of a series of loose, flexible steel fingers adapted to this sort of work. The secret in using the weeder successfully is to use it 2 1/2 times. It cannot distinguish between the farmer's friends and his enemies. It just as soon tickle a weed as the corn plant, and whether the weeds grow with renewed vigor or whether they are destroyed depends on the simultaneous use of the weeder. I want to roll my corn ground once or twice after planting, and my potato ground as a general thing once. The weeder is then less likely to get out or cover up the young plants. It should be used within three to seven days after planting, and at intervals of a week thereafter until corn is ten to twelve inches high, always remembering that the prevention of weeds is much easier than their destruction. Now while we cultivate our crops that we may prevent or destroy weed growth we should remember that this is not the only object of cultivation, perhaps not the main object. We cultivate largely that we may conserve moisture, and as well that we may set free the fertility locked up in the soil. We can conserve moisture better by stirring an inch or inch and a half of the surface soil than we can by digging deeper. I know of no implement that will get over so many acres with as little expense of time and labor as the weeder. It sometimes happens that a very heavy rain will wash some of the soil that the weeder will fall to do satisfactory work. In such cases, if the plant has not appeared above ground, a good harrowing is an advantage. If it has the cultivator can be used to advantage in advance of the weeder. The weeder has other uses than simply the working of the so-called cultivated crops. It can be used to great advantage on wheat and oats. A heavy rain soon after seeding will crust some soils so that many of the plants are unable to break through. The use of the weeder at such times may mean several dollars per acre when we come to harvest our crop. When it comes to covering grass or clover, the weeder is a most satisfactory implement.
