A HORRIBLE DEATH.

Frank Flak Falls From a Wagon and The Wheel is Broken and Crashed by the Wheels.

Frank Flak, a man temporarily in the employ of Koop Bros., was instantly killed on Saturday afternoon last. Mr. Flak was engaged in unloading a car of flour and had loaded his wagon from the car and was on his way to the warehouse in the rear of the store of the above named firm. When he turned into Seventh street the sacks of flour on which Flak was sitting began to slip and as he went over the crossing one of them slid off onto the heels of the horse and he was crowded down onto the pole of the wagon. The horse became unmanageable and began to run and kick, and in Flak's endeavor to control him and save the flour from spilling off the load he lost his footing and fell down between the team and the front wheels. By this time the load had passed the post-office and the team had turned into the alley toward Eighth street, and Flak's body was picked up just at the crossing but he was extinct, an examination showing that the wheels had passed over his head and neck, breaking the latter and splitting the chin. The body was removed to D. M. Clark & Co.'s undertaking rooms and Coroner Holmstead called but an inquest was deemed unnecessary.

The deceased leaves a wife and an infant child to mourn his untimely death, the news of the terrible accident being broken as tenderly as possible to Mrs. Flak, who was present when she learned the facts regarding her husband's death. Mr. Flak was 30 years of age. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon from the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt on Seventh street, south, Rev. W. E. Loomis preaching the funeral sermon, the remains being laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery.
