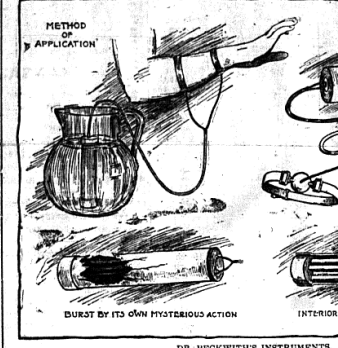

...near Durango. A spring from high up the mountains supplies the water. It was cold water; much colder than the soil it moistened, and the water of the spring near Lake Superior, it was magnetic. In this article the professor described various experiments he had made with bars of two different metals, such as copper and zinc, covered together. He had discovered that when he applied cold

water to the ground a couple of feet and let the circuit (take care of itself) just as it does in an Atlantic cable. The generator I use for the garden weighs over 200 pounds. Its construction is practically the same as that of the one you see here. The force it gives out appears to be much like the force the sun's rays generate when they strike the moist earth—it sets every living thing in the earth to growing. It is not electricity, surely, for electricity tends to destroy all forms of vegetation. It breaks, but never builds. You can produce electricity by rubbing your cold hand over a cat's fur. It generates in the air often enough in summer when a hot current of air striking meets a cold current descending. A flash of lightning is the result of the collision. If you put one hand on a cake of ice and the other in hot water you will generate a current as strong as the current an iron and copper pair generates.

He Knows His World.

Space—I believe that if Babcock were alive at the present time, and systematic in a manner as possible, astronomers are already considering plans for observing the phenomenon. men on both sides of the Atlantic have watched the action of this force. Now, in a steady current from the North, in a tube in which it generates, and all these are passed. Experimental agriculturists are watching its development with interest, too, as it may mean a doubling in the productive power of land. Certainly it is a most helpful agent in the cure of disease, particularly such diseases as are due to germs. Dr. S. H. Beckwith, formerly professor of surgery in the University of Cleveland, Ohio, who is experimenting with the generator, says he believes it will mend a tired garden patch as well as it will a worn-out human being.

The doctor is a gentile old man of 81, with more life in him mentally and physically than most men have at 50. He is extremely busy, but he can find a few minutes now and then, by pulling them out sideways, to talk of his hobby. He has been working in it about nine years, and has interested hundreds of his scientific brethren in his investigations. The little tubes mounted on his desk which he shows his visitor, is not stamped with a patent mark.

"No," the doctor says, "I'm a physician. I have something here that can heal people, and the people are going to have it for just as long as I can make it. I am 81 years old. I've practiced surgery fifty years, and I've been a resident of St. Paul since I was born, and I can help who I'm going to do it. But never mind about that.

"This little tube you see here is the generator, and it's the greatest little thing in the world, I believe. I don't know what it generates. I asked Tom Edison once, and he said I was a fool for asking. Then he laughed. But I guess he was right. Who knows what any sort of force is, any way? Is it electricity or magnetism or heat even? Force is what produces effect. If you see an effect you believe there was a cause close behind it, and you know that some force or other has been acting. That's all you do know, or ever will know.

"Use this bit of metal. It took me six minutes to electroplate it with the generator. That proves there's a force acting, doesn't it? All I had to do was to put the generator in a pitcher of iron water, drop this red cord, the positive pole of the generator, into one end of a vessel of warm water, and this green cord, the negative pole, into the other end. There I had a current passing through the warm water from the positive pole to the negative pole. I attached a 200 gold piece to the positive pole and this bit of metal to the negative pole. MURDEROUS ASSAULT AND SUICIDE.

E. S. Clinch, of Backus, Shoots His Wife Twice in the Head and then Throws His Own Brains Out.
The Woman Will Recover—Jealousy Said to be the Cause.
E. S. Clinch committed a murderous assault on his wife at Backus yesterday morning, shooting her twice in the head, and thinking he had finished his homicidal work turned the weapon upon himself and blew his own brains out. Mrs. Clinch, although seriously wounded, was brought to this city and placed under the care of Dr. McPherson, and will recover unless unfavorable conditions set in. The first bullet struck the woman under the left eye and rapped downward, the second shot striking on the jaw on the left side, the bullet taking a downward course and lodged in her neck. How the woman was escaped being killed outright is a mystery. Mrs. C. E. Scribner, a sister of the wounded woman, and who accompanied her to Brainerd, stated to a Starax reporter that the deed was done on account of jealousy. Mr. Clinch being a man of 70 years and his wife 38. They were married last fall and opened a small store and hotel at Backus. The couple apparently did not get along very well and Clinch finally occupying apartments separate from his wife in a log shack close by. He was postmaster at Backus, as well as proprietor of the stopping place. He was jealous even of women who associated with his wife according to Mrs. Scribner's story. On the 3rd of July Clinch went to Walker and on the morning of the 4th Mr. Clinch came to Brainerd to spend the day and "do some trading." Clinch returned to Backus the morning of the 5th and found his wife absent, as she did not return until Wednesday evening. He was evidently very much provoked at her absence and when he met her at the train the greeting was anything but cordial. Mrs. Clinch did not see him again until the next morning when he entered the kitchen where she was getting breakfast and told her he had come in to kill her, and locked the door where she told her story. The corpse of Cass county was sent for and the wounded woman was brought to this city on the first train.
The man who committed the terrible deed formerly lived at Anoka and has a family of grown up children by a former wife. He was well known in Brainerd, having been in lumbering business for many years.

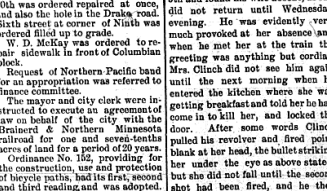
