

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

\$5000 in City Funds Disbursed—Other Business Transacted.

The city council held a regular meeting on Monday evening. Reports of the city clerk showed municipal court collections in July to be \$221.25, and electric light collections \$1,630.02.

Claims against the city aggregating \$5,000 were allowed, including about \$2,000 for electric light supplies, over \$100 for new hose and the rest was small claims and the city pay roll.

The matter of reconstructing buildings on Laurel street, if violation of the fire limit ordinance, was referred to the fire committee in conjunction with the city attorney with power to act.

Andrew Olson was allowed \$100 on contract to construct culvert in Southeast Brainerd.

M. K. Swartz appeared before the council in regard to his contract for paving Fourth street. He is unable to secure oak curbing of the dimensions specified in the contract, and desired that the contract be modified accordingly. The council, however, considered it had no power to make a change and Mr. Swartz requested that action be deferred on his bond until the next meeting.

A sidewalk was ordered laid along the west side of lot 18 and block 189 and along the west end of lots 7 and 8 of block 1, Chicago avenue. Addition, also along the west side of block 138.

The claim of Candice E. Grant for \$500 against the city for personal injuries was referred to the street committee to act in conjunction with the city attorney.

The bill of volunteer firemen at tending fires June 15th, was referred to the fire committee.

The clerk was instructed to draw an order for \$5 in favor of E. H. Simmons, bicycle police.

J. Kelleher and Henry Theviott were granted liquor licenses.

A Famous Square.

There is said to be a square in the world by the grand and imposing square of Paris, the Place de la Concorde. On the side of it is the Colonne, on the opposite side the Champs Elysees and on a third the river Seine. In the center stands the obelisk of Luxor, a magnificent monument of red Egyptian granite, 74 feet high and weighing 500,000 pounds. This obelisk was one of two of the same shape and size, one of which was set up by Ramses the Great at the entrance of the temple of Thebes. Mohammed Ali, pasha of Egypt, presented it to the French government, and in 1833 it was removed to its present position in the Place de la Concorde. The removal and erection of the present obelisk cost an outlay of 800,000 francs and the employment of 300 men, the obelisk being transported to France in a vessel built especially for the purpose. The obelisk is the only one of its kind in the world. It was there that the guillotine was erected in the reign of Louis XVI. and it was there that the guillotine was used in the execution of Louis XVI. and Marie Antoinette were beheaded there in 1793, and it was the scene of great rejoicing in 1848, when France was proclaimed a republic. The Place de la Concorde has also been termed the 'Louis XV and Place de la Revolution.'

Nettlestake's Palace.
