

ACCEPTANCE ADVISED

MAJORITY OF CUBAN COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS READY TO REPORT.

APPROVE THE AMENDMENT

Secretary Root's Explanations Made It Acceptable—Minority Members United States Will Oppose the Treaty—Announced of Trying to Delay the Final Action of the Constitutional Convention.

Havana, May 16.—A majority of the committee on relations, Senors Teyayo, Vilomenda and de Quesada, are in favor of the committee making an immediate report advising the constitutional convention to accept the Platt amendment. Senors Gomez and Silva are strongly opposed to this action. It is said that Senor Gomez in drawing up the minority report interests the explanations of Secretary Root as an affidavit that the United States will change the Platt amendment if the Cubans insist upon it, that clause will be adopted guaranteeing the absolute independence of Cuba, that the third clause will be necessary, and that coal and naval stations.

Senor Gomez was not present at the meeting of the committee. The majority claimed that he was trying to delay the letting of the committee before the convention for final action. When was sent to Senor Gomez that he would be allowed 24 hours to bring up the minority report.

SUPPORT GOVERNOR DOLE.

Republican Members of Hawaiian Legislature Prepare a Statement.

Honolulu, May 8.—The Republican members of the legislature and the members of the central committee in secret and joint caucus have endorsed the action of Governor Dole in refusing to extend the session of the legislature, and after the adoption of the home rule resolution of last week, making charges against the governor, asking for his removal and declaring that he was responsible for the failure of the legislature to do any amount of business, the Republicans prepare a statement in reply.

The reply states that the home rule party, having complete control of the legislature, blocked the passage of substantial legislation; that bills were not logically put together that it was impossible to do anything with them; that the home rule party was content to tamper with the constitution and that that party's bickerings caused the president of the senate, himself a member of the home rule party, to resign in protest. The reply states that finally that one of the causes of failure of members of the home rule party to attain their objects and which prevented the legislature from accomplishing more was the indifference by the home rule members upon the issue of the Hawaiian language in the legislative proceedings, notwithstanding the organic act provides that "all legislative proceedings shall be conducted in the English language." They objected to interpretation and required interpretation of all bills, resolutions, motions and debates.

The reply admits a lack of harmony between the legislature and the governor, but states that the legislature did not deal with the governor in a broad spirit and that past influences were permitted to interfere with the conduct of the legislature. Continuing the reply says:

In refusing to extend the session of the legislature the governor acted with the concurrence of the Republican members of the same.

This memorial is signed by all the Republican members of the legislature and by members of the executive committee of the Republican party.

SENIOR TOWNE INVESTING.

Will Buy Texas Oil Lands for a Minnesota Syndicate.

Austin, Tex., May 16.—Senator Charles A. Towne of Minnesota, who is at present in negotiating for the purchase of a tract of 16 acres in the heart of the oil field. The prospective purchase price of this land is said to exceed \$1,000,000. It is understood that Mr. Towne is acting for a syndicate of Minnesota capitalists, although he holds a large interest in the land if it is purchased.

VITALITY AT LOW EBB

MRS. McKINLEY'S ILLNESS DOES NOT YIELD TO MEDICAL TREATMENT.

DOCTORS IN CONSULTATION

While Not Regarded as in Immediate Danger of Dissolution Her Friends Are Approve—The President Announces the Abandonment of the Northwestern Part of His Tour.

San Francisco, May 16.—Owing to the very serious character of Mrs. McKinley's illness the president has decided to abandon his contemplated Northwestern tour and to return to Washington direct as soon as Mrs. McKinley is able to stand the journey. The gravity of Mrs. McKinley's condition has been known to the members of the president's party for several days, but had been concealed from the public that she would be so ill as she had so frequently in the past when suffering from one of her periods of depression and with a few days of absolute quiet rest he had been treated to normal conditions. But her present illness has been attended with entirely new complications which have not yielded to treatment and the president has concluded that it was time the public should be apprised of the true situation. He is also anxious that the citizens of the cities and towns along the abandoned route of return trip who have made such generous contributions for his visit should receive prompt notification of the circumstances which compelled his decision. The bulletin which the secretary Cortelyou gave to the Associated Press announcing the abandonment of the tour, coupled with another announcement that Mrs. McKinley's condition was better in some respects but worse in others, prepared the way for the bulletin issued two hours later that Dr. Henry Gibbons, a celebrated physician of San Francisco, had been called in consultation with Dr. Hirschfelder and Dr. Risley. Dr. Gibbons has a reputation here for his skill in the treatment of internal disorders. It was the president's own wish that another physician be called in consultation, not because he did not have perfect confidence in Dr. Hirschfelder and Risley, but because he desired that nothing that could be done should be left undone. He was especially anxious that the diagnosis of the attending physician should agree. Ever since Mrs. McKinley arrived at the Scott residence she has been depressed and her extreme weakness has been the most alarming feature of her condition. Her vitality has been at low ebb and she has seldom spoken to those about her. When she is conscious she recognizes the president and asks for him. She is not responsive to the danger of dissolution and the abandonment of hope that she will rally, but in her weakened condition there could not fail to be apprehensions that the illness will be fatal. Mrs. McKinley's illness has cast a shadow over the whole city and the people have shown their sympathy in a multitude of ways. The president has received telegrams of sympathy and inquiry from all parts of the country.

ROW AMONG MARINES

Unhappy Situation Has Developed at Cavite.

Manila, May 16.—An unhappy situation has developed at the headquarters of marines in Cavite. Colonel Henry C. Cochrane was recently ordered home and Lieutenant Colonel Manoli C. Goodrell, formerly commander under Colonel Cochrane at Olongapo, was ordered to relieve him. When Lieutenant Colonel Goodrell arrived to succeed Colonel Cochrane the two officers had an altercation which resulted in Lieutenant Colonel Goodrell's denouncing alleged acts of Colonel Cochrane in connection with the Olongapo command. Colonel Cochrane reported to Rear Admiral Knappt that Lieutenant Colonel Goodrell was intoxicated and that he might be arrested him, ostensibly on the authority of Rear Admiral Knappt. The latter disclaimed having given such order and reported the situation to Washington with the result that Colonel Goodrell remains in custody and Lieutenant Colonel Allan C. Repton has been placed in command at Cavite, relieving Colonel Cochrane. All are now awaiting the result of a court inquiry.

Return to His Old Home to Die

Quincy, Ill., May 16.—Rev. Alexander Burgess, Protestant bishop of Quincy, who has been confined to a hospital for some time, will be taken Friday to his former home in St. Albans, Vt., to die. Bishop Burgess, 82 years old and his case is pronounced hopeless.

New Road to the Sea

Chicago, May 16.—A number of Chicago capitalists are planning to build a railroad from St. Ignace, Mich., to the sea. It has been incorporated in Michigan under the name of the Northern Michigan railroad. The line will be 60 miles long.

WILL BE A COMPROMISE

Winners of Northern Pacific Fight Will Be A Compromise. New York, May 16.—The Press says: Compromise will follow the contest for control of the Northern Pacific. One faction has control of the stock of the common and preferred shares together, while the other faction has absolute control of a majority of the common shares, the directorate and the property. The question to be discussed during the compromise will be a legal one and hinges upon two interesting and novel issues. Under the articles of incorporation "the company" has a right to retire the preferred stock. Just what "the company" is counsel for the contestants must decide. If "the company" includes the directors and the common stockholders the Morgan party can retire the preferred stock, thus wiping out even a chance of the preferred stockholders voting with the Kahn-Loh-Harriman combine. If the general acceptance among railway bankers that for this reason control of the property vests absolutely with the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co. and its associates.

MATRED OF FOREIGNERS STRONG

Passes Rigids Only Within Range of the Rites of the Heavens. Vancouver, B. C., May 16.—According to reports brought by the Embassy of India, Wang Lu Hsien, Chi Li province, where Wang Stonehorse was killed, has recently been in the bloody conflicts with the convicts. Twelve hundred men, Chinese and others, have attacked the convicts and slaughtered the native Christians by scores. The Mercury says that these reports only within range of the rites of the Heavens, but being as strong as ever. There is a report from Tientsin that several thousand insurgents have assembled in the province and that they are indulging in all kinds of crimes. They are pillaging houses, plundering tax collectors and declaring their intention of setting up a new empire. The insurgents are said to include people who have lost their homes and possessions in the course of the military operations in the Chi Li. Of 120 cases of homicidal plague in Hong since Jan. 14 112 had died.

ABOLISH LEAF ASSESSMENT

Lower Ancient Order of United Workmen Adopt Classified Plan. March 16th, May 16.—The grand lodge of the Ancient Order of the United Workmen, by an almost unanimous vote, decided to modify the level assessment plan, hitherto in vogue, and adopted a plan, which will be put in effect at once in Iowa. Mr. M. J. Morris of Muscatine was elected grand master workman; H. P. Rehkopf of Des Moines, grand recorder; Hartung of Des Moines, grand trustee; W. M. Myers, R. L. Tilton, A. C. Weeks of Waterloo, supreme representatives. Council Bluffs secured the next meeting.

SENATOR BEVERIDGE GOES TO STUDY COMMERCE

Senator Beveridge Goes to Study Commerce After Landing in London. Indianapolis, May 16.—United States Senator Albert Beveridge has sailed for Russia to study commercial conditions. During his trip he will also investigate the industry situation in England and Germany, and he may then extend his journey through Siberia. Senator Beveridge believes the United States can secure the immense bulk of Russian foreign trade and that Russian and American relations grow more and more intimate. He will be gone until October.

WANTS EMBASSIES TO CO-OPERATE

Constantinople, May 16.—The foreign embassies have received a note from the port in connection with the recent controversy regarding the foreign postoffices in Constantinople, protesting that the "susceptibility" of the emnities were wounded by the previous note and hoping that the embassies will co-operate in bringing about a settlement of the question in accordance with the desires of the port.

TO DO AWAY WITH SUGAR BOUNTIES

London, May 16.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, in making reply to the request of the West Indian committee for a rebate on colonial sugar, indicates that the government has obtained information that an international conference for the suppression of sugar bounties is expected to meet shortly for the purpose of considering proposals having such an object in view.

WHY RATIFY POSTAL CONVENTION

London, May 16.—It is reported from Constantinople, that the correspondent of The Standard, "that the port is awaiting the ratification of the postal convention in Washington several years ago. If this report is true it is true that Turkey and Greece have started a conflict with the powers.

CHURCHES TO FORM A TRUST

Evangelical Denominations of Toledo, O., Will Combine. Cleveland, May 16.—Special to The Plain Dealer from Toledo says: Toledo Evangelical churches are to form a trust. The plan has been approved by the pastors' union and will be submitted to the various congregations next Sunday. The object is to concentrate forces, economize effort and afford a solid front against individual, public and private evil. There are in the city 183 religious gathering places to a population of 145,000. The creation of unnecessary churches will be opposed. Where a neighborhood has sufficient church accommodation whatever denomination the federation will stand against the erection of other churches. Where it is conceded that a neighborhood needs a church a canvass of the people will be made and the denomination possessing the most adherents will be aided by the other denominations in the erection of a suitable edifice. A prime idea of the federation will be to stand as a unit for Sunday observance and for the abolition of gambling and other evils. The opinion now is that every Evangelical church in the city will enter the federation.

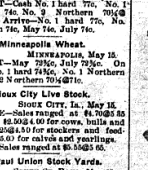

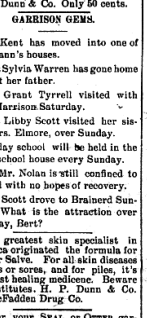

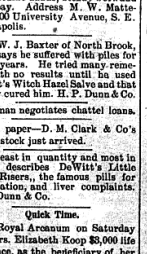
Tried to Hoodoo Him.

 Warning Against Forest and Prairie Fires

Office of State Forest Commissioner, St. Paul, Minn., March 21, 1906.
 Chapter 130 of the General Laws of the State of Minnesota for 1903 (Act of April 18th) constitutes Superintendents of Towns, Mayors of Cities and Towns, and village councils Fire Wardens, and it is their duty to take precautions to prevent forest and prairie fires, and to see that all extinguishers are kept in proper condition; and in case of any fire, to call together any organized male person, over eighteen years of age, to assist. Reprisal of such fires with particular regard to fire responsibility shall be made within the week. The Forest Commissioner is required to make the duty of the Superintendents of Towns, Mayors of Cities and Towns, and village councils of each county to cause said notices to be published at least three times of the official paper in each county each year, between the 15th of April and the 15th of November, and they are hereby directed to establish this notice entire. Under said law

penalty not exceeding \$500 or imprisonment in the State prison not over ten years or both:

Any person who maliciously sets or causes to be set on fire any woods, prairie or other combustible matter, whereby the property of another is destroyed and life is sacrificed.

Any person refusing, without cause, to assist the wardens in extinguishing forest or prairie fires.

Any person who willfully, negligently or carelessly sets on fire, or causes to be set on fire, any woods, prairie or other combustible material, thereby causing injury to another.

Any person who shall kindle a fire on or dangerously near to forest or prairie land and leave it unattended, or who shall be a party thereto.

Any person who shall use other than incense, or shall use such other than incense, in connection with the offering of other exposed light or dangerously near to forest land.

Any person who shall willfully or carelessly deface, destroy or remove this or any other warning placard posted under the requirements of the above mentioned Act.

Any railroad company willfully neglecting to provide efficient spark arresters on its engines; or to keep its light of way to the width of 100 feet cleared of combustible material; or which shall fail to comply with other provisions of section 12 of the above mentioned Act.

The following are liable to a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50:

Any railroad employe who willfully violates the provisions of section 12 of the above mentioned Act.

Any owner of threshing or other portable steam engines who neglects to have efficient spark arresters, or who shall deposit live coals or hot ashes without extinguishing the same.

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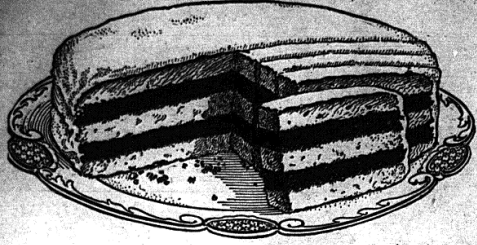
