Resolved, That we extend our most heartfelt sympathy to all who have suffered by this loss; and be it further

SOMETHING BESIDES WERIED WILDERNESS

W. D. Washburn Jr. Very Much Pleased With His Northern Trip.

UNDEVELOPED FERTILE REGION.

Doom for Millions of Settlers in the Counties He Visited Recently.

W. D. Washburn, Jr., has just returned to his home in Minnesota after traveling through some of the counties of the northern part of the state, including Crow Wing, Cass, Aitkin and Itasca.

Mr. Washburn was very much surprised with the fertility of the soil in those counties and contrary to the usual impression that has gone abroad that those counties abound with dense wilderness, big game and lumber jacks.

He found the country well adapted in many respects for agricultural purposes and capable of maintaining two or three million inhabitants.

Regarding his trip Mr. Washburn said: "The magnitude and wealth of the northern counties of Minnesota is not understood by the people of the state."

While it is commonly thought that Brainerd is in the northern part of Minnesota, it is almost in the center.

There is a large area of good land north of that city, and it is upon the development of it that the future growth of the Twin Cities depends in large measure.

Starting Staples I traveled over 400 miles northward by team, and with the exception of a few townships I found no bad lands—none, in fact, in the northern part of the state, outside of St. Louis county, so poor as the counties of Sherburne, Anoka and other prosperous counties in the neighborhood of Minneapolis.

It will be a matter of surprise, no doubt, but the principal product of this section is corn—low corn, 12 feet in height—just ripening, was what I found running from two to three tons to the acre this season, and hay stacked in the meadows was selling at from \$5 to \$6 per ton.

Many settlers who bought land at \$5 or \$6 per acre had bay standing upon it which would bring them \$10 to \$12 per acre.

Orow Wing county, which was formerly a part of Cass county and which I lately visited in the east, is of the same character, but is slightly more rolling than Cass county. It is interspersed with fine lakes and has a beautiful view of the country.

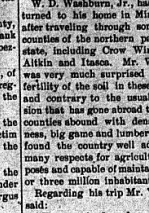

RESTRICTIVE FIRE NARROWLY AVERTED

Brainerd Fire Department Responds Promptly and a Spread is Stopped.

TWO BUILDINGS BURNED.

Disastrous Fire at Bendjidi Destroys M. & I. Roundhouse Monday.

What at first promised to be a disastrous conflagration to the city of Brainerd was narrowly averted at an early hour Monday morning by the promptness and efficient work of the Brainerd fire department. About 12:05 o'clock that morning an alarm was sent in from the first ward and the hose company No. 1 quickly responded.

Fire was discovered in the old black smith shop belonging to W. F. Holst on Fourth street, and when the department arrived the flames were issuing from the west end of the building.

The wind was blowing terrifically from the west and Chief Benson at once grasped the situation, realizing that with such a gale directly from the west, that the entire business portion of the city was imperiled. He at once directed his attention to the buildings across the street and detailed men to watch the flying embers as they whirled and swept over the city. Chaires reached as far down as Eighth street and it is said that several buildings caught fire at one time or another. The wind further calamities that had already occurred, the chief called on Home Company No. 4, from Southeast Brainerd, and fourteen out of the membership of sixteen quickly responded, and appeared at the fire shortly after 2 o'clock. They did good work all night nearly and assisted materially in quenching the flames. The people of Brainerd should be thankful to the fire ladders for their efficient work.

It is understood that the building owned by Mr. Holst was covered with insurance. There was considerable machinery in the building at the time, including several new binders which were being stored there, which, of course, were not covered by insurance. The building just south of the Holst building was also burned. The buildings were both frame structures, but the last mentioned was being occupied every day. It was owned by K. W. Lynch and was occupied by Ben Sowders, who conducted a blacksmith shop. Mr. Sowders had been in the building only since the first of the month, and it is understood that his tools, etc., which were bought of P. J. Hartly, were uninsured, and the loss falls quite heavily on him.

The origin of the fire remains a mystery. The building where the fire started, has not been occupied for months and no one is known to have been in the building since about two weeks ago. It is used almost exclusively of late for storage purposes. The fire started in the northwest corner of the building and being of flammable material the structure soon went up in smoke. The Last Turn saloon had a close call and the building, which is owned by J. M. Gray, was badly scorched.

Mr. Holst had \$1500 insurance on the building, but figuring in the building and the contents he claims that it is about a \$300 loss.

Mr. Lynch had \$100 insurance on the buggies and wagons in the building belonging to him which was burned and \$100 on the building. This about covers his loss.

The Minnesota & International suffered a severe loss that morning at Bendjidi by the complete destruction of their roundhouse at that place by fire. The fire caught in the engine room somewhere and before the flames could be controlled the entire building went up in flames.

Two engines which were in the roundhouse at the time were burned and the total loss to the company will be about \$10,000.
