Ham Hong, the Chinaman, who was sent to Stillwater from this city charged with murder has made application to the pardon board but according to the following from the Pioneer Press he was turned down: The state pardon board yesterday denied a pardon to Ham Hong, the Chinaman from Crow Wing county, who is serving a twenty-five year sentence at Stillwater on a charge of murdering another Chinaman. No appearance was made in the case, and the members of the board felt that the documentary evidence did not justify releasing him.

MEETS DEATH IN A TRAGIC MANNER.

Peter Easton while Enroute to Brainerd Hurled Under Moving Train.

UNIDENTIFIED FOR TWO DAYS.

Several of His Friends who Had Known Him Did not Recognize Him.

The man who was enroute to Brainerd from Aitkin on a freight on Monday night and who was thrown from the train and instantly killed near Cedar Lake has been identified as Peter Easton, a well known logging contractor of Aitkin.

A queer coincidence connected with the death of this man was the fact that, although he was well known in Aitkin, his remains would have been interred there in a pauper's grave had not a friend with whom deceased was well acquainted happened to view the body last night at Aitkin.

Any number of people living in Aitkin had seen the man, but on account of his badly disfigured face he could not be identified. Last night K. Olson, with whom the man boarded, happened to go to the morgue with the undertaker, and he was amazed and dumfounded when he learned that the dead man was his old friend.

Mr. Olson is in Brainerd today and he said that Easton ate his dinner and supper with the family Sunday, but had not been seen since that time. Nothing was thought of his absence, as it was his custom to go out in the country for days at a time without leaving word.

Mr. Olson did not know that Easton was coming to Brainerd, but he was told last night by some one that that was where he was headed for.

It is not known how he fell from the train, but when his body was found it was severed in two, several cars having passed over his abdomen.

FINAL RESTING PLACE.

The Funeral Services Over the Remains of the Late Frederick Deeg Held Yesterday.

The remains of the late Frederick Deeg, who dropped dead while on his way home from Brainerd, near Daggett Brook Saturday night, were brought to the city Wednesday afternoon and were removed to the R. M. Clark morgue where coroner Reichstedt viewed them but decided that an inquest was not necessary, as it was apparent that the man had died from heart trouble.

The funeral services were held at the Swedish Lutheran church this afternoon, nearly all members of the family being present. Rev. A. H. Carver, of the Presbyterian church officiated and interment took place in Evergreen cemetery.

The deceased was sixty-six years of age and was a highly respected gentleman. He leaves a wife and a large family of grown children who have the sympathy of many in Crow Wing county in their hour of bereavement.

Mr. Deeg was born in Wurttemberg, Germany, in 1844 and came to America when he was seventeen years of age. Shortly afterwards he went to Ontario, Canada, where he lived for years and later married Miss Rose Hohisel. Some years ago he moved with his family to Redwood county this state but last spring moved to Crow Wing county, and secured local land near Daggett Brook.

He leaves ten children, four girls and six boys, besides a loving wife to mourn the loss. The children are: Mrs. Lizzie Porter of Missouri; Mrs. Mary Deeg, and Mrs. Carrie Schmitt, of South Dakota; Miss Emma Deeg, of this county; John Deeg, Canada; Joseph Deeg, of Redwood county; George Deeg, and William Deeg, South Dakota, and Fred and Albert Deeg who live in this county.

Deceased was a man universally liked and although a resident of this county but a few months had made many friends.

A. F. LUDWIG IS FATALLY INJURED.

Was thrown from His Wagon in a Runaway Wednesday Near Buffalo Creek.

PHYSICIAN GIVES LITTLE HOPE.

Well Known Throughout the County Being Prominent in Populistic Circles.

August Ludwig, well known in this county, being a resident of Crow Wing township, was seriously if not fatally injured Wednesday in a runaway.

He had been to Brainerd and was going home about 6 o'clock. He was driving a span of horses and when near Buffalo creek about 3 miles out the horses became frightened and started to run. They became unmanageable and Mr. Ludwig could not control them. The horses whirled the wagon with terrific force against a telegraph post after they had gained considerable speed and Ludwig was thrown violently to the ground. Besides sustaining injuries to the left leg it is thought that the wagon wheel hit him on the right side of the face.

Another farmer who was following a short distance in the rear picked him up and he was in a semi-conscious condition. He was loaded into a buggy and brought to the city and after being moved to the Stratton hotel, Dr. Bateheller was called.

The physician stated last night after a thorough examination that he did not think the injured man would survive through the night but the spark of life burned on and this morning while very low he lingers through the hours at the threshold of death. It is thought that a blood clot has been forming and that it will eventually end his existence.

GUILTY, BUT SMALL FINE.

Ed. Johnson Charged With Assault on A. E. Gustafson Has His Hearing Wednesday.

Wednesday the case of the State vs. Ed. Johnson was concluded and the defendant was found guilty by the court and was fined \$5 and costs.

Ed. Johnson was charged with assault on the person of A. E. Gustafson about 5 o'clock Saturday evening. The difficulty having been started in the first place by the former trying to overrule and jacket of Gustafson. Gustafson reported the matter to headquarters and Johnson and another man were freed.

The case was called Wednesday before Judge Mantor and there were all kinds of witnesses. Of course the complaining witness claimed that Johnson came to the engine where he was working and deliberately started in to pound him. On the other hand Johnson claimed that he went around to where Gustafson was working and that Gustafson called him a foul name and said that he would settle it right then.

No Licenses To Motor.

Aitkin People Hold a Meeting and Decide to do all kinds of things in the Brainerd here.

A meeting of the farmers of the upper Mississippi valley and the citizens of Aitkin was recently held at Aitkin and the matter of securing relief from the unusual overflow which they claim for a number of years have ruined their crops, was discussed.

TWO HUNDRED MEN EMPLOYED.

Bolin & Wood will have Four Engines and One Hundred Logging Cars at Work. The Brooks' Timber company has closed a contract with Bolin & Wood of Brainerd to log between 80,000,000 and 120,000,000 feet of pine logs the coming season in the woods north of St. Louis county. These logs will be hauled by rail to Scanlon where they will be saved in a mill that is being built. D. P. Broke is quoted as saying that this mill will be ready to begin operations about Oct. 25. There are 25,000,000 feet of logs in the river near the mill that have been floated there during the summer. A new railroad is being built by the Brooks' Timber company to haul to their mill at Scanlon logs from the timber lands recently purchased in St. Louis county. There have been sixteen miles of the road built and the remainder of the track is being rapidly constructed. Four engines and one hundred logging cars will be used on the road. The company will put 200 men in the woods north of Cass lake and expect to cut 25,000,000 feet the coming winter. — Stillwater Gazette.

LUMBER COMPANIES HAVE TO DIG UP.

SUPERINTENDENT FARR SAID TO HAVE BEEN DETAINED BY THE DEPARTMENT.

SHORTAGE OF FORTY THOUSAND FINDINGS IN ALLEGED TIMBER FRAUDS ON WHITE EARTH INDIAN RESERVATION.

The return of Capt. Merzer to the Indian agency at Leech Lake, Minnesota, will probably be followed by some interesting disclosures in connection with the White Earth timber matters, according to a Washington correspondent. It is stated in the interior department that instructions will soon be forwarded to Capt. Merzer directing him to make a demand upon the timber companies that secured contracts under the recent operations to pay over to the government approximately about \$400,000, which represents the value of the green timber which was cut under the deal and down operations in violation of department regulations. This demand is understood to be based upon the recent report of Mr. O'Neill of Wisconsin.

Mr. O'Neill's report substantiated that forwarded the department some months ago by Supt. Farr, who at that time became involved in controversy with Capt. Merzer concerning the correctness of Farr's conclusions. Department officials assert that Secretary Hitchcock still has confidence in Capt. Merzer, believing that the green timber was cut during the deal and down timber operations without his knowledge.

EASTMAN'S JOB.

He Will Succeed W. B. Mitchell As A Resident Member of the Normal Board.

Alvah Eastman, of St. Cloud, was yesterday appointed a director on the state normal school board to succeed William B. Mitchell, resigned. Mr. Eastman has formerly signified his willingness to serve.

AGED FARMER'S SADDEN DEATH
He Falls From His Wagon When Within a Short Distance of His Home.

AFFECTED WITH WEAK HEART.
He Had Been a Resident of the County but a Short Time.

Fredrick Deeg a man sixty-six years of age, who has been a resident of Crow Wing county but a short time while driving to his home in the vicinity of Duggett Brook from Brainerd, dropped dead Saturday night. He and one of his sons had been with Brainerd and were on their way home the old gentleman driving one team which took the lead and his father was following a short distance behind with another team. They were within a few miles of their home when the sudden ending of the old gentleman's life occurred.

He was heard to give no outcry and the first indication that the young man received that his father was dead was the fact that the horses stopped, the lifeless form having fallen to the ground at the same time clanking the reins.

The young man was horror stricken and ran to the nearest residence, that of William Tudor. The remains of the old man were taken to Mr. Tudor's and the other members of the family were summoned. HIS WOUNDS MAY YET PROVE FATAL.
Accidental Discharge of a Rifle May Yet Cost Al. Norton His Life.

AMPUTATION IS NECESSARY.
Young Willie Willett May Lose A Hand, As a Result of Gun Shot.

Al Norton, a laborer, who has been in the employ of William Rogers in the Boy River country was brought in from the north this Monday and taken to the St. Joseph's hospital, and he is a rather serious condition.

Last Friday night he and another man working for Rogers went out to look for some ponies that were lost. Norton's partner carried a rifle with him and somehow as they were riding along the road the gun was accidentally discharged. The bullet penetrated Norton's left leg just below the thigh and passed almost through, lodging just within the skin on the other side. It cannot be definitely determined whether any of the bones were shattered, but it is thought that they were, and that an amputation will be necessary.

Thursday morning Dr. Camp and Thabes made an examination of the wound caused by the accidental discharge of a 30.30 rifle in the thigh of Alfred Norton, the man who was brought to the city Monday from the Boy River country. It was ascertained that the bullet passed almost completely through the thigh from rear to front. The lead was removed but upon further investigation it was found that the bones in the thigh joint and through the pelvic were completely shattered, and to save his life an amputation would be necessary.

The doctors state that the amputation may save the man's life but he will recover. His relatives in the east have been notified and it is expected that it will be heard from this afternoon and it is satisfactory to them the operation will be performed at once.

RULE WILL BE ENFORCED.

Secretary H. M. Bracken, of the State Board of Health, Sends Out a Letter on Vaccination.

The following has been given out for publication by Secretary Bracken of the state board of health, which will be of interest:

Word has been published broadcast that Attorney General Douglas has furnished the state superintendent of public instruction an opinion to the effect that the order of the state board of health under date of August 12, 1901, requiring all school teachers and pupils to present a certificate of vaccination on or before October 15, 1901, could not be enforced. This is a mistake.

The attorney general did give an opinion in 1900 to the effect that compulsory vaccination of school children could not be enforced unless smallpox was present as an epidemic.

Under date of July 16th, 1901, an opinion was given from the attorney general to the effect that smallpox was epidemic in the state of Minnesota at the present time and that therefore the state board of health had power to order a general vaccination of school children. It was upon this opinion that the state board of health, at a special meeting August 12, 1901, passed its order. It asserted its position on this question by calling a regular meeting October 15th.

SHOULD MIND OWN BUSINESS.

President Ankeny of State Normal Board Tells the St. Paul Globe Same in Plain Language

"The short of it is that the board of control will be asked to come into court and show cause why it should not mind its own business and leave us free to mind ours." Thus spoke President A. T. Ankeny, of the normal board yesterday in reference to the light between the two boards, says the St. Paul Globe.

The matter has finally reached a stage where a settlement out of court is an impossibility, and while the normal board is at court it proposes to have the vital questions settled for all time.

President Ankeny, Supt. Olson and Assistant Attorney General Donahower were in consultation yesterday as the method of court proceedings.

The case will be delayed a short time as Attorney General Douglas is out of town and it is necessary to get his consent to quo warranto proceedings before the matter is taken to the supreme court.

With the exception of J. C. Norby, of Ada, the members of the normal board have written a Supt. Olson stating that they were in favor of starting proceedings in the courts at once.
