### SENATOR WINDOM'S REPORT.

The report of the Senate Committee  
 on Transportation, of which Commit-  
 tee Senator Windom, of Minnesota, is  
 Chairman, has been submitted to Con-  
 gress, and is a monument of well earned  
 fame to the Committee and Mr. Win-  
 dom. Of the report the St. Paul Pion-  
 eer in a very lengthy article says:

"Whatever be the fate of the recom-  
 mendations made to Congress by the  
 Senate Transportation Committee, one  
 thing is certainly gained, viz: a con-  
 tribution to the knowledge of the  
 people on the whole subject of trans-  
 portation, of absolutely incalculable  
 value, and of a thoroughly exhaustive  
 nature. Whether as regards the evi-  
 dence accompanying the report, which  
 covers and includes all the ramifica-  
 tions of the subject, or the deductions  
 derived therefrom, or the conclusions  
 and recommendations of the commit-  
 tee drawn from the vast volume of  
 evidence, the document is a compen-  
 dium of vitally important informa-  
 tion which will pass into the records of  
 the country as a standard of never-  
 failing value, and furnish figures, facts,  
 and arguments for editors, writers, and  
 politicians, until the system of trans-  
 portation therein recommended shall  
 have become a part of the polity of  
 the people, and a crowning glory to  
 the great and prosperous nation having  
 the wisdom, the courage, and the per-  
 severance to carry it to a successful  
 end."

We attempt to give in this place only  
 the merest skeleton of an abstract of  
 this report, with a perfect knowl-  
 edge that no adequate conception of  
 its varied contents can be acquired  
 short of a thorough study of the bulky  
 volume itself."

The Minneapolis Tribune says of the  
 report and Mr. Windom's speech:

"Through Mr. Windom's entire  
 speech, and we understand, through  
 the exhaustive report on which it is  
 based, there is no single attempt to  
 pander to prejudice of any one interest,  
 class or locality, no trace of partisa-  
 nship, no purpose manifested, except to  
 reach a just and practical solution of  
 the problem of the whole country. No  
 better evidence can be afforded that  
 the aim of Senator Windom has been  
 to meet this great and all absorbing  
 issue in a spirit of truthful and candid  
 inquiry, with the view of bringing the  
 most effective relief to our people, than  
 the fact that this report, so important  
 and vast in its conclusions, should  
 have received the unanimous endorse-  
 ment of a committee of nine Senators,  
 made up from both political parties  
 and embracing some of the most able  
 minds of the United States Senate—  
 it is only on certain assertions of con-  
 stitutional power that any dissenting  
 opinion is found. Upon that question  
 Senator Windom, who drew up the  
 report, goes further than some of his  
 colleagues in the claim of constitu-  
 tional power in Congress to regulate  
 all railway transportation."

The magnitude of the document is  
 thus spoken of by the Press:

"We publish elsewhere the meat  
 of Mr. Windom's speech delivered in  
 the Senate last Friday, in which he  
 embodies the general results and con-  
 clusions arrived at by the committee  
 on cheap transportation, of which he  
 is chairman. Mr. Windom's speech in  
 full would fill twelve solid columns of  
 the Press."

The report itself  
 will cover about 250 pages of the or-  
 dinary Congressional octavo, while the  
 statistical appendix will embrace as  
 much more."

It is universally conceded by the  
 press of the country that the report of  
 this committee is one of the most stu-  
 pendous, and important documents  
 ever promulgated by the Congress of  
 the United States.

**NORTHERN PACIFIC FARMING.**—From  
 Mayor White, who has this week been  
 to Moorhead and back, we learn that  
 Mr. Engelbretzen, at his place four  
 miles north of Lake Park, has got his  
 little patch of wheat about all in.  
 The little patch consists of 1,500 acres  
 in one field. Twenty-six double teams  
 are at work dragging in the seed. This  
 field will, with a fair season, yield at  
 least 30,000 bushels of the golden  
 grain, or \$30,000 in fifty lucres.

Many other extensive farms are be-  
 ing opened up along the line. Among  
 the number is one by Thomas H. Can-  
 field, near the farm named above; Mr.  
 Canfield will have two sections, or  
 1,280 acres broken up this season as a  
 commencement.

### CONGRESS MAN.

The Audubon Journal of last week  
 seems to have a Congressional opinion  
 or two also. In a very sensibly writ-  
 ten article it suggests Ex-Gov. Wm.  
 R. Marshall as a very available candi-  
 date, closing with the following para-  
 graph:

"Believing, that even in this dis-  
 trict, the party will be defeated if it  
 does not conform to the prevailing  
 sentiment, we suggest Ex-Gov. Wil-  
 liam R. Marshall, of St. Paul, as a man  
 upon whom the people could unite  
 safely and carry through without dis-  
 tinct to their own interests or those  
 of the Republican party."

And we say, that unless we can  
 have a man from "this end," that  
 Gov. Marshall would indeed reflect  
 great credit as a member of Congress  
 both on the party and on the State,  
 as a pure politician, a gentleman of  
 ability, and a man whose personal  
 character is unquestioned.

The same paper also has this com-  
 pliment for one of the esteemed citi-  
 zens of Brainerd, in connection with  
 Congressional honors, and were the  
 party heavy enough at "this end" to  
 permit of our entertaining a serious  
 hope of scooping the "other end" in  
 convention, we should take the matter  
 into more earnest consideration than  
 to merely produce the Journal's com-  
 pliment, which is as follows:

"We have heard the name of C. B.  
 Sleeper, Esq., of Brainerd, mention-  
 ed as a suitable person to represent the  
 interests of our frontier counties in  
 Congress. Mr. Sleeper is one of our  
 ablest lawyers, a profound thinker,  
 and possesses great popularity through-  
 out the district."

The Minneapolis department of the  
 St. Paul Pioneer also contains an item  
 in the same direction—all of which  
 items are news to us, as they are the  
 first intimation that we have had of  
 any of Brainerd's citizens being thrown  
 upon the surface for Congressional  
 honors. Let the ball roll, however,  
 and if, with "this end," we can even  
 succeed in securing the "other end," it  
 will be one point gained for the future.  
 The Pioneer says:

"Mr. E. H. Davis is our authority  
 for the statement that Capt. C. B.  
 Sleeper, of Brainerd, is becoming a  
 prominent candidate for Congressional  
 nomination in this district."

JUDGE O. P. STEARNS held his first  
 term of court in this city this week.  
 Many important matters in law were  
 brought before him, though there  
 were no really red-hot trials "on" this  
 term—a very quiet term indeed, and  
 withal a most shamefully unproductive  
 harvest for the Statute lingers.—  
 Judge Stearns presided with eminent  
 ability, and to the perfect satisfaction  
 of all concerned, so far as we have  
 learned.

An ordinance has been passed re-  
 quiring all places of business to be  
 closed on Sunday, of whatever char-  
 acter. Also, another ordinance remov-  
 ing the disabilities of produce peddlers—  
 see ordinances elsewhere.

Bow, wow!—The Council has done  
 one noble thing; they have imposed a  
 tax on all dogs; male dogs one dollar  
 and female dogs two dollars. Now, if  
 the ordinance (which appears in to-  
 day's TRIBUNE, and should be read by  
 all owning dogs,) is only enforced to  
 the letter, what a blessing that ordi-  
 nance will prove to this dog-blighted  
 town! No more howling by kingdoms,  
 no avalanche of hydrophobia this season,  
 no curtailment of unseemly conduct  
 on the part of the dogs, and a less  
 number of dogs to the square-inch.—  
 A hash factory would doubtless do  
 well in Brainerd as soon as that ordi-  
 nance gets to working right good. It  
 is estimated that there are 2,000 dogs  
 in the city, and it is claimed that  
 1,000 is enough to do all the business.

 name of the "Brainerd Base Ball  
 Club," into a permanent association.

 nine, which proposes to go into train-  
 ing at once to secure the champion-  
 ship of the State for our thriving city:  
 President, Francis M. Rorer; Vice  
 President, C. W. Darling; Secretary,  
 F. A. Smith; Treasurer, W. C. Davie.  
 Thirty-five members are enrolled, and  
 the encouragement received from our  
 people will inspire the players to win  
 laurels for themselves and their  
 friends.

On Tuesday evening, at J. W.  
 Steel's law office, some of our best  
 men came together to perfect an  
 organization under the name of the  
 "Young Men's Club," for the purpose  
 of affording recreation for mid and  
 body, under influences more whole-  
 some than those which now surround  
 our youth. It is the intention of this  
 Club to erect a suitable building in a  
 convenient locality, where there shall  
 be a reading room, gymnasium, games  
 and pastimes, such as billiards and  
 cards, and a place for social entertain-  
 ment of an attractive character.  
 The following officers were elected:  
 President, H. A. Campbell; Vice

### DISTRICT COURT.

The April General Term of District Court convened at Big Lake, on Tuesday last, Judge O. P. Stearns presiding, and the large number of twenty-six cases on the calendar were all disposed of by Thursday noon; but the Grand Jury still being in session, the Court did not adjourn until four o'clock yesterday.

Below we give a condensed report of the proceedings as reported to us by the Clerk, W. W. Hartley.

Henry Keller vs. Henry Whipple, an action for debt. Was settled.

Adam Plaine vs. W. W. Hartley, an action for Replevin. Continued to next General Term by stipulation.

E. S. Smith vs. W. W. Hartley, an action of Replevin. Continued to next term, by consent.

J. S. Stiles vs. J. W. Reed, an action for debt. Settled.

Martha A. Reed vs. J. W. Reed, an action for divorce. Was continued to next term, by stipulation made by plaintiff's attorneys and defendant in person, which defendant's attorney argued was not a good stipulation, but held good by the Court.

Ana Lufkin, by her next friend, Louisa Lufkin, vs. Henry Whipple, an action of Replevin. A motion to dismiss the appeal was denied by the Court, whereupon, upon motion of defendant's attorneys, the Court issued an order to the Court below for an amended transcript. The amended transcript having been obtained, was objected to by plaintiff's attorney, and taken under advisement by the Court.

Louisa Lufkin vs. Henry Whipple, an action of Replevin, appealed from Justice Court, was tried before a Jury, and verdict returned for plaintiff, and the value of the property assessed at \$50.00.

Jas. Smith vs. The Glenn, an action for debt, appealed from Justice Court, was continued to next term, upon motion of defendant.

E. F. Patwell vs. Rachel Patwell, an action to set aside marriage, was referred to D. O. Preston to take and report the testimony, upon which the Court entered a decree declaring the marriage null and void.

John C. Meyer vs. A. F. McKay, an action for civil damages, was continued upon stipulation that either party may amend pleadings.

A. F. McKay vs. Wadena Co., an appeal from the Commissioners of that county, was tried by the Court, and after taking the testimony, the defendant was allowed thirty days in which to prepare written argument, and plaintiff thirty days thereafter to reply thereto.

E. H. Bly vs. L. Allars, et al, an action for foreclosure of a mortgage, was, upon motion of defendant's attorney, stricken from the calendar.

John Bronchaw vs. A. F. McKay, an action of Replevin, was settled at defendant's cost.

Peter Walters vs. Closterman & Martin, an action for debt, appealed from Justice Court. An application by defendant's attorney to file an answer, was granted by the Court upon payment of \$10.00 to plaintiff, and case continued to next term, by consent.

Mary Aitken vs. Robert Aitken, an action for divorce, was referred to C. B. Sleeper to report the testimony.

Carlus Grandelmeier vs. Chris. Grandelmeier, an action for divorce. An order for the publication of summonses granted.

Jane Armstrong vs. Richard Armstrong, an action for divorce, referred to D. O. Preston to take and report the testimony, upon which report a decree of divorce was entered.

Henry Ward and Wm. Saunders vs. J. C. Walters, an action for debt, appealed from Justice Court. Plaintiff allowed to amend complaint, and case continued, by consent to next term.

S. S. Gardner vs. L. L. Gardner, an action for divorce, referred to H. M. Fuller to report evidence.

C. S. Nickerson vs. N. Tibbetts, an action for debt, appealed from Justice Court. Judgment of Court below affirmed.

State vs. Thomas Riley; charge, assault with intent to do great bodily harm. Defendant plead guilty of assault, and not guilty of the intent, and was fined \$85.00.

State vs. M. McMahon; charge, selling whisky to Indians. Bail reduced from \$400 to \$200, and case continued, by consent, to next term.

State vs. J. C. Walters, charged with defacing a building, the property of Ward and Saunders, continued, upon motion of defendant, to next term.

City of Brainerd vs. Edward Morison; charge, gambling, appealed from City Justice. A motion by plaintiff's attorney to dismiss the appeal granted.

State vs. W. W. Hayford; charge, assault and battery, appealed from Justice Court. A motion by plaintiff's attorney to dismiss the appeal granted, and the case continued to next term.

City of Brainerd vs. P. H. Trudell and J. Sullivan; charge, violation of City Ordinance, appealed from City Justice. A motion by plaintiff's attorney to dismiss the appeal granted.

### ORDINANCE NO. 11.

An ordinance to compel the owners of dogs to procure a license, and to prohibit dogs from running at large in the City of Brainerd, and to give the City Recorder power to issue licenses and had such dogs registered and numbered.

The Common Council of the City of Brainerd do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The owner or owners of every dog and bitch who now is or may hereafter be found within the limits of the City of Brainerd, shall procure a license from the Recorder of said city to keep said dog or bitch, and to permit the same to run at large in the City of Brainerd, which license shall be granted to any applicant therefor, upon his paying to the City Treasurer the sum of one dollar for each dog, and two dollars for each bitch to be owned and kept by such applicant, and filing with the City Recorder his receipt therefor, and paying to said Recorder the further sum of twenty-five cents as his fee in full for registering and numbering each of said animals and issuing said license.

Section 2. Before the onset of any dog or bitch shall permit the same to run at large in said city, he shall, in addition to procuring said license, put a collar on said dog or bitch, on which shall be placed, in legible figures, the number of said animal as registered and licensed by the Recorder.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of all police officers of said city to shoot or otherwise destroy every dog or bitch which he may find running at large on the streets, alleys or commons of said city without license and without collar, or which shall receive the sum of twenty-five cents for each dog or bitch he may so destroy and bury or dispose of, to be paid by the city.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect from its publication.

### ORDINANCE NO. 12.

To amend Ordinance No. 7 as amended April 23d, 1873.

The Common Council of the City of Brainerd do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 7, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the hawking and peddling of goods, wares and merchandise in the City of Brainerd," as amended April 23d, 1873, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

No person or persons shall hawk, sell or peddle, or offer to sell, any dry goods, clothes, fancy goods, lace, trimmings, buttons, notions, or any other goods, wares or merchandise except farm produce, from place to place, house to house, or in or about the streets of the City of Brainerd, without first having received permission of the Mayor of said city, and a license therefor, signed by the Mayor and attested by the Recorder of said city, and paid to the Treasurer thereof the sum of Thirty Dollars lawful money, provided that no license shall be issued for any term less than six months, or more than one year; all licenses to expire on the last day of April of each year.

Section 2. Whoever shall hawk, sell or peddle, or offer to sell, any dry goods, clothes, fancy goods, lace, trimmings, Yankee notions, or any other goods, wares and merchandise except farm produce, in or about the streets of Brainerd, or from house to house, or place to place within said city, without first having complied with the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than Fifty Dollars.
