AGREABLE to previous arrangement by the Executive Committee, the meeting of the Northern Pacific Editorial Association was held in Duluth, Wednesday evening, June 9th, 1876.

Secretary W. F. Ball read the lengthy proceedings of the first and last meeting, held at Brainerd a year ago, which was listened to with great interest by the members.

The next business was the election of officers for the ensuing year, which resulted as follows: President—E. B. Chambers, Fargo Times.

Vice-President—W. W. Hartley, Brainerd Tribune. Secretary—W. F. Ball (re-elected). Treasurer—M. C. Russell (re-elected).

A large amount of unimportant business was done, and a committee, consisting of Messrs. Ball, Hartley and Pressnell, was appointed on resolutions.

WEEKS. A long period of time has elapsed since the commencement of the construction of the Northern Pacific Railroad, and it is now a matter of vital importance not only to the State of Minnesota, but to the people of the Northern Pacific country.

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Thunder and Lightning, Wind, Hail and Rain. Great Damage to Buildings and Crops. A little the worst tornado and hail-storm passed over this section on Wednesday it has ever been known to witness.

The hail broke a window on the north side of our office, the rain appeared to pour in everywhere, and for a time we were, as Donnelly says "dashed". We were made very busy moving desks, books, papers, etc. to dry spots, while the lightning flashed about our ears growling more vivid with every flash, peal upon peal of thunder seemed to roll down the very roof, each more deafening than the last, and in such rapid succession not giving us time between to ascertain whether we were in this world or the next; the hail, the wind, the grape-shot, splitting the shingles, and adding to the general tumult and dismay.

As soon as the storm was over we went up town to count the killed and wounded. We climbed over trees, waded brooks, and finally reached our destination. Mr. A. A. White's lumber tent was swung in strings on the neighboring trees to dry, the glass in nearly all the windows on Front street broken, twenty-eight lights in Cass Co. Court House destroyed, the N. P. R. Reception House destroyed, the North side of the city escaped damage.

The injury, however, sustained by the crops was much greater. W. Beane estimates his loss at over \$500.00, S. English at over \$300.00, E. W. Wood about the same, D. McNammy \$300.00 to \$400.00, N. E. Brown nearly \$500.00. Hail stones were picked up that measured over six inches in circumference.

The very heavy rain of the day previous had washed away the track at this place, which was not discovered until too late to avoid the accident. Though the engine was reversed, and everything possible done to stop the train, the engine and five freight cars were derailed.

The Superintendent, John H. Sullivan, Road Master Wm. Fitzpatrick, Engineers Chas. Saunders and Clinton Rand, and Fireman Chas. Foster were on the engine. Messrs. Sullivan, Rand and Foster jumped the engine, but Fitzpatrick and Saunders remained aboard and were instantly killed, and Sup't Sullivan sprained his ankle in jumping from the engine, otherwise no one was injured, though a large number of passengers were aboard, as the passenger cars fortunately remained upon the track.

LATER—Since the above was in type we have learned the following additional facts and corrections regarding the accident: Sup't J. H. Sullivan and Road Master Wm. Fitzpatrick were riding on the pilot and not in the cab. Sullivan did not jump off, and does not know how he escaped death, or yet how he was hurt, and it is a miracle he was not killed, as he was sitting upon the side of the engine that went down. Saunders, Rand and Foster were in the cab, and several cars went over them—one a flat-car, with two men on it, who were unhurt—and after the accident Rand and Foster crawled out of the cab, not injured, as stated above, though not seriously hurt. H. S. Lyle, telegraph repairer, was riding on a freight car, and badly hurt by the car falling upon him, rupturing his abdomen. Sup't Sullivan and Lyle arrived here yesterday by train—both pretty sore.
