The remains of Rev. A. A. Sutton arrived at Brainerd on Friday night of last week, and his funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at the M. E. church. Rev. E. R. Lathrop, the presiding elder of the district conducting the services. On Saturday, by the consent of Mrs. Sutton, Dr. Ross opened his head and removed and examined his brain, finding it badly diseased in parts - in fact no part of it being in a healthy condition. It gave strong evidences of deficiency of nutrition, which has tended to reduce its capacity of size, so that it only weighed forty-one and a half ounces, or eight ounces less than the average brain of male adults. The doctor gives it as his opinion that the disease was originated by chronic dyspepsia and congestion of the brain, added by the irritation of a slight fracture of the skull on the back of the head, which must have been caused by a blow that he must have received there some six or eight months ago, but of which his wife or friends have no knowledge, except that he has complained frequently of late of pain in that part of the head. This, the doctor thinks, has produced acute mania, which produced insanity and resulted in death from exhaustion.
