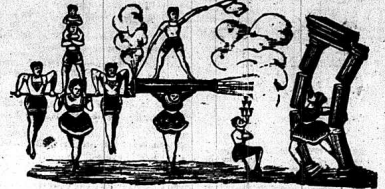

The governor of Texas has confessed that he refused to unite with the other states in thimblewing services, because he didn't believe there was a man in the state of Texas knew how to pray. The secretary of the treasury, having decided to anticipate the payment of the called bonds due October 1, anticipates also the criticism that he may suffer for this act by giving his reasons for it to the press. The payment is made not to relieve the stringency of the money market or to please the bill interest in Wall street; but to relieve the treasury of an uncomfortable plethora of cash. The cash balance has risen to \$16,000,000 and is increasing daily. The policy of the treasury is to keep it down to \$10,000,000 and leave the rest of the money of the country in circulation. It is in the execution of this policy that the present premature payment is made. It is thought that the increasing treasury receipts will permit the secretary to issue another call for bonds, to be paid December 1, and the banks are beginning to speculate anxiously about its effect upon the bond market.
